Briton Arrives To Write Story On 'Mars Bluff'

At least one British reporter was among the scores of newsmen who descended on Florence yesterday to cover the "Mars Bluff Story."

The Britisher was Bruch Rothwell, American correspondent for the Liberal London News-Chronicle, which has a circulation of 1,650,000 over the British Isles.

"Interest is running high over there in this story," he said.

A storm of protest has risen in Britain in recent months, he said, over reports that American and Royal Air Force jet bombers fly over Britain daily carrying unarmed hydrogen and atomic bombs.

Laborite leaders in Britain have asked that the planes make their patrol flights with dummy bombs until an East-West Summit conference can be held.
